

'Whale Oil to Whole Foods' Eco Art Exhibit at GCCA

"Whale Oil to Whole Foods", eco art exhibit opens June 9 at the Greene County Council on the Arts Catskill Gallery, with additional exhibit sites opening July 14 at the Cornell Cooperative Extension's (CCE) Agroforestry Center in Acra. This partnership project is curated by eco artist Christy Rupp, whose interest in this project stems from her own work and world travels connecting art and environmental activism.

Rupp selected 35 proposals for gallery display and site specific outdoor installations from both Hudson Valley artists and the United Kingdom.

Related events, including hands-on art making workshops, tours and seminars, will take place during July and August at the CCE Agroforestry site including a series of panel discussions on environmental issues and "Forests, Foodies, Foraging", a mushroom walk and dinner with Larry Litt.

A reception for Part 1 of this exhibit will be held Saturday, June 9 from 5-7 p.m. It will be on view through July 28 at the GCCA Catskill Gallery 398 Main Street, Catskill. Gallery hours are Monday – Saturday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

GCCA Sprouts Program Registration begins May 1

Registration will begin on Monday, May 1, 2012 for "Sprouts," the Greene County Council on the Arts free summer arts program for children ages 3 to 7.

Workshops will be held at six locations: Windham-Ashland-Jewett Elementary School: July 9 – 13; Coxsackie Elementary School: July 16 – 20; Cairo Elementary School: July 23 – 27; Greenville Elementary School: July 30 – August 3; Catskill (location to be determined): August 6 – 10; Hunter Mountain Learning Center: August 13 – 17.



The Greene County Council on the Arts congratulates all grant recipients. The intent of these awards is to ensure a wide range of exciting, high caliber, and innovative cultural programs for our communities. The activities of these organizations provide a positive and substantial impact on local economies

The Greene County Council and on the quality of our lives. The GCCA and the Greene County Legislature are committed to the continuation of quality arts programming and related activities for the benefit of our residents. 2012 GREENE COUNTY INITIATIVE PROGRAM GRANTS

GCCA received requests from 10 cultural institutions totaling 62,475 - more than three times the amount of available regrant funds. Ten CIP awards were awarded as follows:

Bronck Museum of the Greene County Historical Society was awarded \$2,200 to continue, expand and promote cultural, educational, and arts programming, including Music of History series, Heritage Craft Fair and Chilly Willy Tours.

Catskill Mountain Foundation. Inc. was awarded \$3,000 toward artist fees and related costs for year-round performing arts series, which includes dance, theater, classical music, pop music and family performances.

free103point9 Wave Radio was awarded \$1,200 in support for WGXA, Hands on Radio (90.7 FM), a community run media project.

Horton By The Stream was awarded \$1,000 in support toward artist fees for free summer professional staged readings of Horton Foote's play, "The Prisoner's Song" plus "Train in the Distance", a new play by

Inter-Cities Performing Arts, Inc. was awarded \$500 in support for two Cappuccino Concerts plus a production of a play by Moss Hart.

Music & Art Centre of Greene County was awarded \$2,350 toward the 2012 season of summer concerts, classical music series and Ukrainian folk arts workshops at the Grazhda in Jewett Center.

Planet Arts was awarded \$1,650 toward support for the 2012 Jazzone2one Series.

Cole National Thomas Historic Site - Cedar Grove in

Catskill was awarded \$2,400 in these organizations that make support for exhibition of paintings of Louis Remy Mignot, one of the only Hudson River School artists to hail from the South.

Windham Chamber Music Festival was awarded \$2,500 in support for five concerts at the Windham Performing Arts Center in Windham.

Zadock Pratt Museum was awarded \$1,200 in support for a full season of community and educational programs with a special season-long photography exhibit by Prattsville photographer Larry Gambon.



Chad Weckler Solo Exhibition at American Glory Restaurant Gallery

Columbia County Council on the Arts presents the photography of Livingston artist Chad Weckler in the Upstairs Gallery at American Glory Restaurant and BBQ, 342 Warren St., Hudson May 23 through July 29. The show reflects his collection – photography stimulated by finding the extraordinary in the ordinary.

Weckler has been a commercial and fine art photographer for more than 30 years, working primarily in New York City and now in the Hudson Valley. He grew up in Sausalito, California, the son of one of San Francisco's top advertising photographers of the '60s and '70s, and began taking photos with his brownie box camera when he was seven. Framing and capturing images is just part of his "wiring."

Weckler has been a member of the American Society of Media Photographers since 1974. In 2005 he launched VictoryPix, a website business for the licensing of photography and artwork. Since the 1980s he has taught and lectured on various aspects of professional photography. In 2008 he was one of 12 artists chosen from the Hudson Valley to participate in the New York Foundation for

the Arts (NYFA) inaugural MARK program, and in 2010 was one of two selected artists from the Hudson MARK'08 program to be trained as an artist consultant. From 2008-11 he served as a grant panelist on the CCCA/Decentralization board. In 2009 he was Chair of Columbia County Council on the Art's 15th Annual ArtsWalk.

In 2010 Chad became an underwriting coordinator for local radio station WGXC and also is a monthly programmer hosting a program entitled "The Art of the Hudson Valley." He is co-director of the Hudson Music Festival and is the liaison project director with their fiscal sponsorship through Artspire, a program of NYFA. He currently serves as a member on the Hudson Business Coalition Executive Committee.

Wexler's collection of photographic works can be seen in his book "Uncommon Beauty" that was released in 2011. This book was a part of the exhibition "bookMARKS" curated by Carlos Loret de Mola and Willson Cummer, in partnership with The Indie Photobook Library and the Society for Photographic Education's regional northeast Conference, in conjunction with LightWork and Syracuse University.



Kaliyuga Arts Presents 'The Mound **Builders' at StageWorks/Hudson**

Lanford Wilson's classic Obie-awarding winning drama "The Mound Builders" will be presented by Kaliyuga Arts at Stageworks/Hudson for seven performances, May 11 through May 19.

Equal part thriller, mystery story and epic family drama, "The Mound Builders" follows a group of archaeologists as they race against time to excavate an ancient Native American burial site before it is engulfed by water.

Many of the issues Wilson deals with in this play have recently gained a new currency. It examines the clash between urban and rural sensibilities very red state/blue state. It deals with the very different ways men and women strive to make a mark in the world, to leave something behind. And it does all this in a complex, non-judgmental way. There are no villains or heroes - the characters wind up being more complex and conflicted than you might have anticipated.

Originally based in Los Angeles, Kaliyuga Arts has since productions while Patterson performs in them. As an Equity actor, Patterson also works in major regional theatres nationwide.

How do we construct the idea of nature in a time when farmland rapidly sprouts shopping centers, and as we witness the commons being enclosed before our eyes?

Consider this: about one third of the nation's land mass is forest and around 43 percent of that resource is publicly owned! In the Hudson Valley, 60 percent of the forested land is held in private, non-industrial ownership. As such, the host of this project, County Greene Cornell Cooperative Extension's Agro-Forestry Center, is playing a formative role in reviving a fundamental concept of the commons by demonstrating that 'cooperative' management can augment land productivity.

The Center is not only committed to preserving the vitality of these land holdings, but to using forests for the production of the American Chestnut, understanding the impact of deer overpopulation, cultivation of wild fruits, chips, medicinal herbs, honey, mushrooms, and maple syrup. – from Strategies/Tragedies of the Commons, an essay written by Linda Weintraub for our show.

"We were interested in using the analogy of Whale Oil in the title because it references the commercial origins of the region, but also illustrates how our dependence on energy can rapidly destabilize things," said Rupp, "as happened to the whaling industry in Hudson which had a dazzling economic boom for a few brief years before the civil war, quickly displaced by the discovery of kerosene in 1859, terminating blubber as the primary source of household oil."

What is Environmental Art?

In a general sense, it is art that helps improve our relationship with the natural world. There is no definition set in stone. This living worldwide movement is growing and changing as you read this. Much environmental art is ephemeral (made to disappear or transform), designed for a particular place (and can't be moved)

or involves collaborations between artists and others, such as scientists, educators or community groups (distributed ownership). These variables can make exhibiting this work difficult for traditional art spaces.

Some environmental art:

•Informs and interprets nature and its processes, or educates us about environmental problems

• Is concerned with environmental forces and materials, creating artworks affected or powered by wind, water, lightning, even earthquakes

• Re-envisions our relationship to nature, proposing new ways for us to co-exist with our environment

• Reclaims and remediates damaged environments, restoring ecosystems in artistic and often aesthetic ways –from greenmuseum.org

It is about a juggler, a street singer, a quack, a sewer man, a deaf girl, a busboy and a dishwasher. It is about two love stories, young and old. And it is about saving the world.

"It is April in Paris," Smith says. "But something is wrong. A greedy 'not-human' race has crept in like a virus threatening this city that even the Nazi's spared. Time for a new French Revolution? Only a mad man or woman - would dare."

Smith lived in Paris just after World War II, the period in which the play was first produced. She fell in love with Giraudoux at that time. She even played the role of "The Countess Aurelia" in a production of this play several years ago.

Smith translated and directed Moliere's, "The Miser" at the Ghent Playhouse in 2003.

As an actor, her most recent stage appearance was in "Enchanted April" at The Circle Theater Players in Averill Park. Her career has spanned five decades and includes acting,

directing, producing, and teaching.

Appearing as Countess Aurelia, the Madwoman of the title, will be Nancy Hammell. Other Playhouse favorites in supporting roles are: Bernadine Handler, Lael Locke, Wendy Power Spielmann, Paul Murphy, Marie Allocca, Michael Meier, Jill Wanderman and Mark Wilson. Many actors new to the Ghent stage augment the cast.

Producer and Production Stage Manager for the show is Paul Leyden. The set is being designed by Joe Iuviene with lighting by Bill Camp and costumes by Joanne Maurer. Original music for the production has been written and will be performed by Catherine Schane-Lydon.



Association Day at Bronck Museum

On Sunday May 20, the Bronck Museum near Coxsackie will hold Association Day festivities to commemorate the 237th anniversary of the signing of the Plan of Association, known locally as the "Coxsackie Declaration". The document was one of the first formalized written complaints issued by residents of the American colonies against the British crown.

Dated May 17, 1775, it preceded its much more famous descendent the Declaration of Independence by well over a year. Circulated for signature in the Great Imbought (Catskill) and Coxsackie districts, the document would eventually be signed by 220 local residents. Many of the signers have descendents in the local community today. Members of the Conine, Hallenbeck, and Van Loan families were especially well represented among the signers. A listing of all 220 signers will be available. As it may have been 237 vears ago, the "Coxsackie Declaration" will be read aloud. The public will once again be urged to take quill pen in hand and add their signatures to a replica of the original document. Costumed members of the Village Volunteers Fife and Drum Corps will provide rousing Revolutionary War era

Artists are invited to create and submit an original postcard-sized artwork based on one of 20 iconic sites that have inspired artists for centuries and that are now part of the newly expanded Hudson River School Art Trail.

The kick-off event will be held on National Trails Day, June 2. The artworks will be exhibited at the Thomas Cole National Historic Site at a special July show and in an online exhibition that extends over the summer.

In the 19th century, painters, including Thomas Cole, Frederic Church, Jasper Cropsey and many others, who were part of the art movement now known as the Hudson River School created sublime landscape images throughout the Hudson Valley and beyond.

Today, artists continue to create work that is inspired and informed by their experience in the very same landscapes.

In 2005, the Thomas Cole National Historic Site in partnership with Olana and numerous other organizations launched the Hudson River School Art Trail, a series of hiking and driving trails that lead visitors to the places that inspired great landscape paintings of the 19th century. On June 2, the Trail will be greatly expanded, more than doubling its original size. In addition, trail maps, images and in-depth cultural content will be converted to a digital format, made available for free online and optimized for mobile devices.

Artworks can be in any medium or mixed media as long as it is an original, unique, two-dimensional work (no sculpture, no photography) on a stiff board, canvas board, or paper mounted on board that can be hung without a frame, either with hooks or wires attached directly to the back.

All works must be unframed.

Only original artwork will be accepted – no multiples, prints, copies or reproductions.

Each piece of artwork from artists 15 and over will be offered for sale for \$100, and for \$25 for artists 14 and under, unless the artist chooses "not for sale". The artist may choose to donate the 100% of the purchase price or share 50/50. All proceeds will go to further research and development of the Hudson River School Art Trail.

'Bronck Family in the Wilderness' Program

If these strangers in a strange land would survive at all they would need to be clever. They were alone deep in the forest miles south of the small trading community that had grown up around Fort Orange. They had no close neighbors, no reliable food supply, no permanent dwelling, no garden or domestic animals.

If they were to survive life in this wild place they needed to make the best use of what was at hand. Soil and stone, water and wood, even the animals of this place would need to be put to the best and most productive use

possible.

On Sunday June 24 at 2:30 p.m. the Bronck Museum will offer the first of three "Bronck Family in the Wilderness" programs. Each of these special content programs examines an element of the natural environment that shaped the history and development of the 350-year-old Bronck farmstead at Coxsackie.

Noted geologist Robert Titus will discuss the impact of the local soils and stone in the transformation of raw wilderness to productive Dutch farm. Titus will speak in the reading room of the Vedder Research Library on the grounds of the Bronck Museum.



Tom Fraser Returns to Café Gallery with New Exhibit of Local Landmarks

Tom Fraser will exhibit new watercolors of Columbia County landmarks at the Old Chatham Country Store Café Gallery during the month of May. Fraser last showed his work at the Café Gallery in May of 2009. This new show will be on view from May 3 through May 30 with an opening reception to meet the artist on May 6 from 3 to 5 p.m.

Fraser, a native of Philadelphia and currently a resident of Chatham, has long been intrigued by the old landmarks and road signs of his surroundings. Largely a self-taught artist, he took art classes in sixth grade with a local art teacher who introduced him to watercolor, which has since been his medium of choice.

Before long, other beloved places such as Van Buren's Lindenwald and the Claverack Dutch Reformed church cemetery were his subjects.

In 2000, Fraser moved from the Albany suburbs to Columbia County. Bolstered by his other pastimes of running, bicycling, and cruising the country roads in battleship-proportioned Cadillacs, his exposure to the full spectrum of the county's diverse scenery and quirky sites of interest increased exponentially. The watercolors progressed and Fraser landed showings for his work from Hudson to Schenectady. He has executed many paintings on commission as well.

I LOVE YOU GREENE!: Greene County Nourishes Young Writers A Poetry Award for Troy O'Neill

Greene and Columbia Counties have long nourished and inspired artists, beginning with the Hudson River school of painters. It's still going strong and reaching the younger generation.

Troy O'Neill, a 10th grader from Athens, has just won a gold medal National Scholastic Arts and Writing award. His parents, Patricia and Kevin O'Neill, will accompany Troy to New York where the medal will be presented in Carnegie Hall the first weekend in June. More than 200,000 students enter the scholastic competition each year. O'Neill won his award in the single poem category. The winning work expressed deep spiritual feelings as he alternated the lines of an ancient, traditional prayer with his own contemporary, more probing thoughts and words.

"I often work with contrasts," O'Neill said. "I alternate clichés with my words, making jokes that poke fun at consumerism."

"What would you do for a

Klondike Bar" is a commercial he has used.

"It's a catch phrase from the commercial world that I alternate with my own thoughts," he said. "The result is kind of like Pop Art."

O'Neill began writing stories as early as age six and seven and became interested in the arts through parents and teachers, especially at classes at the Athens Cultural Center. He remembers that a class in poetry by Kathe Izzo and a book by Maya Angelo fed into his enthusiasm for contemporary poetry.

When asked what he likes about writing poetry, Troy said

"It allows me to correctly understand the world around me...it gives me a lens to see and notice more."

Asked what he might find difficult or challenging, he said, "Sometimes, with really powerful emotions, words can seem confining. I try to put in too much emotion."

O'Neill attends Tech Valley High School in Rennselaer, where students are chosen by lottery from several districts all across New York State. Students experience project based, handson learning, sometimes working with local businesses to prepare for future work and community involvement.

One of O'Neill's summer projects took place at Olana, the historic home of Hudson River painter Frederic Church. He wrote to the director, showed his qualifications and became a volunteer tour guide, showing visitors around the house and garden.

O'Neill's winning poem will be published in a National Scholastic Arts and Writing publication: "Best Teen Writing, 2012", an anthology that is free to libraries. Here are clips from two of his poems similar in style to his Gold medal winner – a line of prayer inserted between a line of original poetry:

Hail Holy Queen Hail Holy Queen (welcome to the perp-patrol)

Mother of Mercy (in cowl and beads and rusty garb appeared)

our light, our sweetness and our hope (-less mirrors and dark reflections in the half light)

to thee do we cry, (did Noah allow black folk on the ark?)

sinful and sorrowful ("a white trash nightmare where no one gets educated")

O Mother of the World Incarnate (do it to me "Like a Prayer")





"RELAY", by Max Goldfarb, a grouping of Ambulant Transceivers, a series of handmade radio transceivers constructed from reconstituted radio-electronic components, housed inside vintage first-aid tins. "Locations: Relay", represents an equally hand-made security system in the form of a community-watch perimeter check. The localized security network is cobbled together by many collaborating members of an unspecified village, each voice transmission attached to aerial imagery of the territory.

Sam Sebren (Athens, NY) presents "9/11-QVC", an off-air single-channel video work. On the 10th Anniversary of the September 11 attacks in New York City, Sebren videotaped himself toggling his television dial between news coverage in memorial of the attacks and a home shopping network's regularly scheduled programming.

Here Sebren "performs" with a palette of commercial television broadcast re-presenting these transmissions in a critical and reflective light.

"Fill", by Maria Papadomanolaki (New York, NY) is an interactive sound installation using low-power radio transmission. To experience "Fill", attendees will borrow a small radio transceiver and move about the space.

Papadomanolaki's microcast is designed to highlight the physical properties of her sitespecific transmission. Gallery goers will observe distinct changes in what they hear based on their position and movement in the GCCA exhibition space.

Phillip Stearns (Brooklyn, NY) presents his work "Deluge," a sound and light installation that depicts the white noise of unoccupied radio frequencies as a showering rain of light. As digital technologies become more adept at reducing interference and noise through omission and censorship, we are quickly losing touch with unmediated white noise, that static hush in between the stations, and playground for the imagination.


Many antenna-like structures, LED strands, are clustered together each representing the activity of the broadband white noise being picked up by simple transistor receivers.

From these discrete elements, a cloud of lights is formed, filling the space with a form activated by the absence of pre-determined content. The sculpture plays on the poetics hidden within the language of both analog and digital electronics. 'Keeping It Greene' Exhibit at Kaaterskill Fine Arts



The word 'green' – more and more on people's minds today – has a special and direct intensity for those of us who know and love the Mountaintop and spell it with a final 'e'.

"Keeping It Greene" can mean much more than an enlightened attitude toward landscaping. It is also the title of an art exhibit showing April 28 through June 3 at the Kaaterskill Fine Arts Gallery at the Catskill Mountain Foundation in Hunter, New York.

Francis X. Driscoll, whose landscape photographs

Driscoll, known affectionately as 'Fran', has photographed landscapes throughout America, and his reputation is well-known, especially on the Mountaintop. He's a quiet man who lets his camera do the talking.

"Living in the Northern Catskills affords me the opportunity to be close to some of the most beautiful scenery in this country," he explains. "To hike some of the same trails as the famous Hudson River School artists has been both an honor and," he adds with a smile, "sometimes a well-needed release from the outside

of the Catskill Region are widely recognized and loved and Michael Lavery, a folk artist in the Tramp Art genre, have come together as friends and fellow artists to share with us their inventive and thought-provoking expressions created as a direct result of their involvement with experiences before, during and after Hurricane Irene.

Driscoll and Lavery, both full-time residents of Greene County, were deeply affected by the hurricane and its aftermath. As they traveled separately from town to town surveying the devastation, lending a hand where needed despite their own personal losses, each was struck by the spontaneous cooperative efforts of family, friends and strangers who quietly and modestly brought a sense of inner order and peace to the mindless destruction surrounding the area.

They started thinking about collaborating with other area artists to express an artistic re-creation of the beautiful grass roots phenomenon they witnessed. "Keeping It Greene" is the result. The works on view are sentinels to a sense of wonder and respect – that out of the terrible havoc inflicted on Greene County and throughout the Catskill Region, the generosity of spirit and natural good will of men, women and children was far greater than the material destruction and painful human loss.

Lavery is a well-known folk artist with a wonderfully animated sense of creating something from whatever is at hand. This is the definition of Tramp Art, a style of folk sculpture taught to him back in 1957 by a "tramp artist hobo" laid off by the railroad near where he grew up.

He started putting to use the skills the old road man had shown him when he became homeless himself. "I started creating tramp art full steam in 1978 and haven't stopped yet," he says.

Lavery chose 22 of Driscoll's pre and post-flood photos and built frames as a continuation and celebration of the spirit of the Catskills witnessed by both artists. Both artists say there are a few surprises in store for viewers who come to see the show.

An opening reception for "Keeping It Greene" will be held April 28 from 4 to 6 p.m. at the Kaaterskill Fine Arts Gallery located at Hunter Village Square, Rte. 23A (Main St.) in Hunter. Regular gallery hours are Thursday through Saturday 10 to 5 p.m.; Sunday 10 to 4 p.m.
