






GCCA's Annual Youth and Student **Arts Exhibition:** Outside the **Lines 2018**



A MESSAGE FROM BILL DEANE,

Newly Elected President of the GCCA Board of Directors

Members on the Greene County Council on the Arts Board of Directors recently elected me President on January 18, 2018. Former, and long standing, President David Slutzky was elected to Chairman of the Board of our organization. I have served on the GCCA Board for three years. Now as President, I will be very active in the management of the organization with our Executive Director. I know I am joined by the Board Members as well as current and former members of GCCA in congratulating David for all he has done

for the Arts Council for so many years. He will remain active with the organization and I will keep him apprised of the activities of the Board.

For those who don't know me I am a native of Catskill who left after high school in pursuit of my career. I devoted 45 years in New Jersey practicing as a Civil Engineer retiring in 2011 and came home "nearly". My wife, Helen, and I reside in Windham where we are active in the Chamber of Commerce and the Windham Arts Alliance. We are skiers in the winter and golfers in the summer. One of my hobbies is landscape photography which I find very rewarding. I have shown my work in a number of galleries in the area. We have two sons, both married and living far away in California, but we enjoy their company several times a year.

GCCA is currently working on a Strategic Plan for the future of the organization. We are fortunate to have the services of the NY Council of NonProfits (NYCON) to assist us. New York State Council on the Arts (NYSCA) has agreed to fund the work of NYCON. For that we are grateful.

In addition to our current role in the administration of NYSCA Decentralization Community Arts Grant program in Greene, Columbia and Schoharie counties, several early action items have developed as part of the planning process and include expansion of services extended to members who reside in Columbia and Schoharie counties. These services will attract more member involvement with the goal to generate additional revenues needed to facilitate our programs fostering engagement in the arts for people of all ages.

There will be more to come on this including revisions to our by-laws and launching a contest to develop a new name for the organization.

To serve as the organization's President I have begun a detailed review of all activities. One of

the first items I researched is our membership. We have about 450 paying members with many active in one or more ways. Over 60% of the members fall in the Senior or Individual categories with annual dues of \$20 or \$35. There is room for growth! Rather than immediately raising the rates I ask each of you to consider "STEPPING **UP"** when your membership is up for renewal. That means a senior paying \$35 and an individual paying \$50. I STEPPED UP this year when my renewal came due and I know you can too! We will remind you of this initiative when renewal notices are sent out. Please help.

DAVID SLUTZKY BECOMES HONORARY CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

Catskills, in Greene County, David was born into the construction family who built Hunter Mountain and pioneered summit-to-base snowmaking. Slutzky attended the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the University of Pennsylvania. David married Jean Fortune, a competitive ice skater from Lake Placid, NY and together they raised their son, Zach, in Hunter. It is noted with great sadness, Jean Fortune Slutzky, died on February 8, 2018. Jean developed a career in interior design and was recognized for her breathtaking Beaux Arts Ball décor. For the past 29 years David and Jean worked side by side to transform The Copper

Room...a most welcome sight when the snows began to melt and just before spring makes its real appearance. Jean will be missed by all of us at GCCA so many others.

As hosts of the Beaux Arts Ball, David and Jean, invited many friends to their tables making it known as "The Party of the Year!" Every year, David gathered donations for the Silent Action enlisting his artist friends and ski business associates. During the Silent Auction portion of the evening David was often spotted demonstrating the virtues of riding a mountain bike by zipping around the room or suggesting to a friend the hand crafted necklace would be just the right gift for their wife

It was only natural David found interest in the arts. He draws, paints, sculpts and is a photographer. As former co-owner and chief snowmaker of the Hunter Mountain Ski Resort, David Slutzky has compiled a collection of photography featuring the colors of sunrises and sunsets refracted in the mist of the snowmaking process. An avid explorer of the less trafficked mountains of the area, he has also captured some of the most iconic images of the Northern Catskills. His photographic collection presents a meditation on contrast, with dark shadows cutting through

snow-covered landscapes or carving lines beneath rock walls that glisten in the sunlight - a chiaroscuro effect he learned to appreciate during his early days as a student at the Academy. A lifelong artist who has dabbled in many mediums his portfolio includes a selection of quiet black and white scenes as well as pencil sketches and illustrations. He has shown his work in many galleries in the region and his works are included in many private collec-





Greene County Council on the Arts' SPROUTS Program, now in its 32nd year, is a FREE summer arts workshop series with sites in Windham, Coxsackie, Cairo, Greenville, Hunter and Catskill for children ages 3 to 7 who reside in Greene County, NY. Beginning May 1, 2018 parents or guardians may register their children for workshops in either the Art & Music workshops or the Theater & Dance workshops. Classes are limited to 15 children per classroom so advanced registration is necessary. The program serves 60 children every week and 360 throughout the summer. Program hours are 10:00 to 11:45 a.m. in each the locations. SPROUTS participants will experience two

alternating 45-minute workshops with a healthy snack served between sessions. Specific locations and dates for SPROUTS 2018 will be available by early April 2018.

AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS PASSED AT GCCA ANNUAL MEETING

GCCA's Annual Membership meeting took place on January 27, 2018 at the Catskill Gallery prior to the opening reception of GCCA's 2018 inaugural exhibit, Conversations in Color: Ginnie Gardiner & Martin Katzoff. The first order of business was greeting many new gcca members and welcoming some very familiar and long standing members to the meeting. Bill Deane, who was newly elected as President of the Board of Directors during the January 18th Board meeting, thanked all for their attendance and support. He opened with the announcement in the change in board officers. Deane thanked David Slutzky for his 30 years of service serving as Board President and expressed gratitude David will remain serving as Chairman of the Board. Deane then announced Nancey Rosensweig as the new Vice President and reported Jeff Friedman and Larry Krajeski will continue to serve as Treasurer and Recording Secretary respectively. Deane introduced other Board Members and staff members in attendance and thanked Board Members Paul Poplock and Gretchen Mallory for their commitment and service as they pursue new endeavors. He thanked the volunteers who recently volunteered their time and carpentry skills needed with the re-painting and repairs to the GCCA Catskill

The agenda included a vote to amend GCCA's By-Laws, revised in 2017, with proposed amendments to include Board representation from Schoharie County and Columbia County, develop and expand GCCA's current programs and involvement in both counties and hold separate annual

membership meetings in each of the three counties. The amendments to the By-Laws passed unanimously. This shift also leads to the renaming and branding of Greene County Council on the Arts to reflect the inclusiveness of all three counties as one arts council. Deane launched the renaming contest and proclaimed the winner with the best suggestion will be declared April 15, 2018. (Please refer to following article on the Renaming Contest.)

Deane also requested all members consider raising their current level of membership support and suggested the \$20 senior/student level is a bit too reasonable in today's economy.

GCCA Executive Director, Kay Stamer, took the stage and delivered a passionate review of the year 2017 that she termed as exciting and challenging in regard to the Strategic Plan and Organizational Assessment in the workings with NYSCA and guided by NYCON (New York Council on Non Profits). She also expressed deep gratitude to be working with Todd Whitley, a dear friend to GCCA and digital marketing

strategist, who has generously donated his services to improve our on-line presence and generate additional revenue for our coffers. Kay announced Todd will be presented the Distinguished Service Award this year and at this year's Beaux Arts Ball.

Stamer also reported State funding from NYSCA for General Operating remained level and GCCA received a slight increase for our Decentralization (DEC) Community Arts Grants last year. Our colleagues at ArtsNYS are formalizing their 501(c)(3) status and we are positioning ourselves to be the voice of the Arts statewide. ArtsNYS will be a true statewide advocacy organization. GCCA will update on news and actions.

She also reported the recent hiring of Dennis Shaw as the new Schoharie Grant Coordinator. Renee Nied, who held that position since 2012, moved to Vermont. Kay reviewed the Catskill Gallery art exhibits and associated events and forums, the year of special events and fundraisers (some planned and several "pop ups!") and GCCA's commitment to its youth

art programs. She also reminded members of their role in support and thanked the volunteers who offered their unwavering support. She invited interested members to consider serving on the Board of Directors, but reminded them it was a lot of hard work! Kay Stamer closing remarks reflected over 42 years of service to our community, and stated "we are all the more grateful to our members, donors and friends for your continued support. It is also important to note the wonderful contributions of our exceptionally talented and dedicated staff, Board of Directors, artists and volunteers." ending with "We have been blessed."

Jeff Friedman gave a review of the annual budget and answered questions on budget line items. He also assured the members in attendance many not for profits face the same financial challenges and thanked all for their continued support.





GCCA Announces 2018 Cultural Fund Awards Through the County Initiative Program (CIP)

The Greene County Council on the Arts (GCCA) is pleased to announce the recipients of regrant awards through the Greene County Initiative Program (CIP). Ten not-for-profit organizations in Greene County have been awarded \$26,000 in funding in support of cultural programming and activities for 2018.

The County Initiative Program (CIP) was established in 1983 to provide funding from the Greene County Legislature to major Greene County cultural institutions that offer quality professional services and programs. With invaluable support from the County, this funding continues to promote the development, growth and viability of major Greene County organizations.

Funding awards are competitive and are determined by a select panel of artists, arts professionals, and community members. Deepest appreciation goes to this year's panelists for the Greene County Initiative Program (CIP). Our five panelists were: **Deborah Allen**, former Publisher of Black Dome Press, Hensonville; **Christine Hughes**, Visual Artist, Ravena; **Peter Keitel**, Formerly SUNY Albany Assistant Director of Financial Aid and Program Associate at State Education Department, Visual Artist, Greenville; **Deena Lebow**, Creator NY Communal Table-Art+Talk+Food & Blog; Catskill; and **David Woodin**, Attorney, Former Conductor of Catskill Community Orchestra; Catskill. The panel spent just over three hours jointly reviewing and discussing the ten applications and comparing them against the criteria before making their recommendations. Requests for funding exceeded available regrant monies by over \$11,900. Final recommendations for funding were reached through clear consensus on January 24, 2018. This year's award process was challenging, and GCCA is extremely grateful to these panelists for their hard work and dedication to the arts in Greene County.

The Greene County Council on the Arts congratulates all grant recipients. The intent of these awards is to ensure a wide range of exciting, high caliber, and innovative cultural programs for our communities. The activities of these organizations provide a positive and substantial impact on local economies and on the quality of our lives. The GCCA and the Greene County Legislature are committed to the continuation of quality arts programming and related activities for the benefit of our residents and visitors. 2018 GREENE COUNTY INITIATIVE PROGRAM GRANTS

GCCA received requests from ten cultural institutions totaling \$37,900 – \$11,900 more than the amount of available regrant funds. Ten CIP awards were awarded as follows:

23Arts Inititative (DBA)-Friends of Tannerville was awarded \$2,650 in support for its second annual Jazz in the Snow winter series, providing a total of five mountain top artist visits to schools and free evening performances at Mountain Top Library from January-March 2018 in Tannersville, NY. Bridge Street Theatre, Inc. was awarded \$3,240 for general opperating support to assist in continuing to present theatre, art events and musical productions, which include original productions created by BST artistic team and outside presenters, bringng relevant and affordable theatre to diverse audiences. Bronck Museum of the Greene County Historical Society was awarded \$2,510 to continue, expand and promote cultural, educational, arts programming, including devloping its Music of History series, Heritage Craft Fair and Chilly Willy Tours. Catskill Mountain Foundation, Inc. was awarded \$3,310 for its year-round performing arts programming, now cele-Oth season, of dance, theater, classical, jazz/bluse/pop and folk music and family performances and support for artists in residence free outreach programs for local schools and community events. Music & Art Centre of Greene County was awarded \$2,720 in support for six to eight (6-8) Summer Concerts featuring live performances featuring national and international distinguished musicians and rising young performers in the Classical Music Series and offering traditional Ukrainian folk arts workshops for adult and children. Planet Arts was awarded \$1,370 toward support for Music Mix Initiative which includes one2one jazz series and Tone Structure Lab project. Develop new workshop series, "Navigating the Global Music Marketplace," for artist in all music genres dealing with industry perspectives. Programs will take place at Beattie-Powers Place and Catskill Community Center. Prattsville Art Center was awarded \$1,800 in support for the Next Generation Art Project to establish an expanded public program offering visual arts and installations, music and dance programs March-September 2018 by providing local residents with free access to the arts. Project is a collaboration between four Teaching/Artists interns and young local residents with the goal of building leadership skill and service to the community. Students & Artist/Teachers will be included in "Headed for the Hills" music and art festival in August 2018. Thomas Cole National Historic Site - Cedar Grove in Catskill was awarded \$3,380 in support for its 2018 exhibition "Picturesque and Sublime: Thomas Cole's trans Atlantic Inheritance" in collaboration with the Yale Center for British Art. Projects and activities include an exhibition catalog, lectures, creation of a children book exploring themes related directly to the exhibitions, both guided and self guided hikes, website and audio tours. Wave Farm was awarded \$3,180 in support for Wave Farm Residency Program providing artists with space and resources to create new transmission art works and then conduct multiple public programs including workshops, exhibits/events and broadcasts that are also to be streamed online and partnering with Town of Catskill town meetings and HiLo Catskil live performances to reach more audiences. Zadock Pratt Museum was awarded \$2,020 for operating support for a full season of community and educational programs for all ages including the exhibit "The Three Amos Hamlins" the story of three artists who were also father, son and cousin. The exhibit will coincide with a speaker series nad other

Arts Education, **Individual Artist** and Greene **County Project Support Announced!**

Greene County Council on the Arts is pleased to announce the 2018 recipients of the Community Arts Grants. The Community Arts Grants program is funded by the New York State Council on the Arts (NYSCA) through its Decentralization program. This program provides support for local not-for-profit organizations and artists working with community partners. These funds are intended to reward and bring growth to local programming with strong artistic merit directly benefiting our tri-county

Columbia, Greene and Schoharie Counties have been awarded a total of \$126,000 this year through NYSCA. Re-grant monies have been dispersed as such: Arts Education received \$18,188 (including \$1,000 from Stewarts Shops); \$5,000 has been allocated for Columbia and Greene

Counties to receive an Individual Artist Award of \$2,500 each; and \$103,892 has been awarded for Community Project Support amongst the tri-county area.

Funding is determined by panels of regional artists, non-profit professionals and community members comprising a well-rounded roster of invested, creative persons. Applications for the 2019 cycle will be available later in the spring, with deadlines, to be determined, in Fall of 2018. Greene, Columbia and Schoharie residents are encouraged to apply, and serve as panelists. The Arts in Schoharie County Featuring... **SONNY OCHS**

Ask anyone in Schoharie County if they know Sonny Ochs and you'll get the same resounding "yes." A resident of Schoharie County since the 1980's Sonny is well known as a retired school teacher and local activist. But to many she's most known as a powerhouse in the folk music movement not only in Schoharie County, where she produces her "Not So Quiet" concert series held monthly at the Middleburgh Public Library, but nationally. Sonny told me recently that at 80 years old she's finally learning to say no. I'll believe it when I see it.

For 40 years the radio host and concert producer has been promoting the music of her brother Phil Ochs. After studying journalism at Ohio State University Phil Ochs moved to New York City in the early 1960's to pursue his passion as a singer/songwriter and became a central figure in the Greenwich Village folk music scene. Phil's songs include: There But For Fortune, When I'm Gone, Love Me I'm A Liberal, Draft Dodger Rag, I Ain't Marching Anymore and A Small Circle of Friends. After struggling for years with mental health issues Phil committed suicide in 1976 at the age of 35. Since then Sonny has kept her brother's memory and music alive by crisscrossing the country producing "Phil Ochs Song Nights." Regular performers include Emma's Revolution (Pat Humphries & Sandy Apatow), John Flynn, David Roth, Greg Greenway, Kim & Reggie Harris and Magpie. Many of these same performers along with others, can be heard at Sonny's "Not So Quiet" concert series.

World class folk music artists are willing to travel to Middleburgh, NY located in Schoharie County because of their personal relationships with Sonny and their appreciation for everything she's done throughout the years to promote folk music and folk music performers.

WEST FULTON, THE LITTLE TOWN THAT COULD

Nestled in the hills of rural Schoharie County is the little hamlet of West Fulton. A quiet place, you could live years in the county and never have a reason to be anywhere near it. In an earlier time West Fulton became known to the arts community when movie and TV actor John McGiver bought the old Baptist church that he and wife Ruth, a set designer, restored and raised their ten children in. A number of the McGiver children became involved in theater and music in the area. John, when not in Hollywood working in movies such as Breakfast at Tiffany's, Manchurian Candidate and Midnight Cowboy or TV shows like The Twilight Zone and Many Happy Returns, found time to get involved in local community theater. Ruth taught yoga and ran an Herb Shop and an Antique Store in West Fulton. But after John and Ruth passed away and most of the kids left, West Fulton once again reverted to that quiet little out of the way place that hardly anyone noticed, until recently. As it turned out there were many artists in the hills and valleys surrounding West Fulton, some home grown, others who had come seeking the peace and solitude that is the areas greatest resource.

The West Fulton renaissance started a few years ago when Boris McGiver and his wife, Rebecca Brown, moved back into the old homestead after their daughter was born. In 2014 Rebecca and a group of local residents, driven by a passion for the performing arts came together to present the first West Fulton Puppet Festival. The goal was to bring a free two-day event to West Fulton that showcases family friendly performances by some of the best local, regional and national puppetry artists. This led to the formation in 2016 of West Fulton Arts.

In 2009 Cornelia McGiver and her husband Greg Blum bought an old feed store, built in 1919, in West Fulton and started Panther Creek Arts in The Hall to promote the arts and cultural events. The wife of the stores

original owner was an avid supporter of community theater so she had a stage built in the second floor hall and installed a pump organ, both of which are still there. The stage is now used for live performances, but the organ needs a bit of work. In 2015 Panther Creek Arts held it's first Tiny Arts in a Tiny Town, a mini festival with live music, storytelling, a circus workshop, art gallery openings, local food, museum tours, and local craft beverages.

Tiny Arts in a Tiny Town will be held on May 5, 2018. The festival will showcase a storyteller for children, a theater workshop for teens, three art galleries, one being a sculpture presentation in the park and outdoor grounds, local beverages and foods, and world class musicians performing in the evening. Tickets start at \$5. The West Fulton Puppet Festival will take place on July 13 & 14, 2018 and will feature six professional companies and artists performing in repertory, in addition to puppet workshops, the showing of a community generated animation, live music and a community potluck. The Festival will take place in various locations within the village of West Fulton, including West Fulton Park, Panther Creek Arts, the West Fulton Historic School House, and two village barns that have been renovated as studio spaces. This event is free, but all puppetry performances are ticketed.

Both of these West Fulton events, funded in part, with public funds from the NYSCA/ Decentralization Community Arts Grant Program administered in Schoharie County by the Greene County Council on the Arts, continue to strive in 2018. 



PICTURESQUE AND SUBLIME: THOMAS COLE'S TRANS-ATLANTIC INHERITANCE THOMAS COLE NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

The Thomas Cole National Historic Site announced today that the exhibition "Picturesque and Sublime: Thomas Cole's Trans-Atlantic Inheritance" will open on May 1 and run through November 4, 2018. Created in collaboration with the Yale Center for British Art and members of the Yale History of Art Department, the exhibition presents masterworks on paper by major British artists, including J.M.W. Turner and John Constable, in a new exploration of the prints and drawings that were early trans-Atlantic influences on Cole's work. The exhibition includes major paintings by Thomas Cole that demonstrate his radical achievement of transforming the well-developed British traditions of landscape representation into a new bold formulation, the American Sublime.

Landscape art in the early nineteenth century was guided by two rival concepts: the picturesque, which emphasized touristic pleasures and visual delight, and the sublime, an aesthetic category rooted in notions of fear and danger. British artists including Thomas Sandby and John Martin, and above all Turner and Constable, raised landscape painting to new heights and their work reached global audiences through the circulation of engravings. Thomas Cole, born in England, emigrated to the United States in 1818, and first absorbed the picturesque and sublime through print media. On this basis, he transformed British and continental European traditions to create a distinctive American form of landscape

The exhibition draws on the rich collections of the Yale Center for British Art, Yale University Art Gallery and Beinecke Library to examine Thomas Cole's visual inheritance. It juxtaposes masterworks on paper by British artists with major oil-on-canvas works by Cole, showing how boldly the American painter responded to and transformed his visual inheritance. The works on paper include drawings, watercolors, etchings and engravings. Among them is one of the greatest large-scale Alpine watercolors by Turner. Additional museums contributing to the exhibition include New-York Historical Society, New Britain Museum of American Art, and Albany Institute of History & Art.

The exhibition is curated by Tim Barringer, Paul Mellon Professor in the History of Art at Yale; Gillian Forrester, Senior Curator of European Art at the Whitworth Art Gallery, University of Manchester (and previously at the Yale Center for British Art); Jennifer Raab, Associate Professor of the History of Art at Yale; and two doctoral candidates at Yale, Sophie Lynford and Nicholas Robbins. The show will take place in the Cole Site's reconstructed "New Studio," a building designed by Thomas Cole. The exhibition is accompanied by a fully illustrated publication - by the same title as the exhibition - with essays by the curators, published by Yale University Press. Following the opening of the show, Professor Barringer will present the Curator's Lecture in Catskill on Sunday, May 13, at 2:00 pm.

The show complements the critically-acclaimed landmark international loan exhibition of Thomas Cole's work now on view at The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City (opened January 30th). Titled "Thomas Cole's Journey: Atlantic Crossings," the exhibition at The Met establishes Thomas Cole as a major artist of the 19th century within a global context and emphasizes Cole's response to his visit to England and Italy in 1828. Its climax is a new presentation of Cole's masterpieces, The Oxbow and The Course of Empire series. That exhibition is curated by Elizabeth Mankin Kornhauser, Alice Pratt Brown Curator of American Paintings and Sculpture at The Met and Professor Barringer, with Christopher Riopelle, Curator of Post-1800 Paintings at the National Gallery in London. It will be on view at The Met through May 13, 2018 and will then move to the National Gallery in London from June 11 to October 7, 2018.

This year, the Thomas Cole Site and Olana will join forces with the New York State Bridge Authority to launch a new initiative to promote the region as an epicenter of American art where the nation's first major art movement began. The project entitled the Hudson River Skywalk will weave together the home and studios of Thomas Cole at the Thomas Cole Site and those of his legendary student Frederic Church at Olana with the landscape that inspired it all to create one seamless experience. With support

from New York State, a continuous pedestrian walkway will connect the historic sites across the Rip Van Winkle Bridge over the Hudson River by 2019. Today, visitors can experience newly installed viewing platforms along the Rip Van Winkle Bridge that feature magnificent views of the Hudson River Valley and the Great Northern Catskills, and visit the two historic sites that are located just two miles from one another.

"This is a landmark year for Thomas Cole, with the international loan exhibition at The Met and the National Gallery, complemented by this tightly focused exhibition at the Cole Site," said Professor Tim Barringer. "We are especially thrilled to share in Catskill works on paper from Yale's collections, including masterpieces that are rarely displayed because of their sensitivity to light. These objects give a vivid sense of what Cole might have seen in the engraver's shops where he apprenticed, first in Liverpool and then in Philadelphia, and in print sellers' windows in New York City in the mid-1820s. The magnificent oil paintings in the exhibition demonstrate how Cole transformed this inheritance, allowing us to appreciate his power and originality, not only as the founder of America's first major art movement but as an artist of international

importance."

"The 200th anniversary of Cole's arrival in America is a time to reflect on Cole's pivotal role in American and international art and on our understanding of humanity's relationship with nature," said Elizabeth Jacks, Executive Director of the Thomas Cole National Historic Site. "Cole was deeply concerned about our impact on the environment, and his appreciation and celebration of the landscape is as relevant today as it was in the 19th century."

The exhibition is supported by New York State Council on the Arts with the support of Governor Andrew M. Cuomo and the New York State Legislature, Empire State Development's I LOVE NEW YORK program under the Market NY initiative, and the Greene County Legislature through the County Initiative Program of the Greene County Council on the Arts and the Kindred Spirits Society of the Thomas Cole National Historic Site. The accompanying publication is supported by the Willow Springs Charitable Trust and Furthermore: a program of the J. M. Kaplan Fund.

TRANSMIT section: Wave Farm transmit and WGXC broadcast partners can transmit their own live audio streams for app users to access. Website visitors will also have access to the streams at wavefarm.org/listen and wgxc.org/listen.

Wave Farm is a non-profit arts organization driven by experimentation with broadcast media and the airwaves. Wave Farm programs—Transmission Arts, WGXC-FM, and Media Arts Grants—provide access to transmission technologies and support artists and organizations that engage with media as an art form. Wave Farm's WGXC 90.7-FM is a creative community radio station. Hands-on access and participation activate WGXC as a public platform for information, experimentation, and engagement. Over 100 volunteer programmers produce shows. Community programs include news and music produced by residents of Greene and Columbia counties in New York, as well as syndicated national programs produced by Pacifica. WGXC commits over 60 hours a week to transmission art and experimental sound.

The Wave Farm App 1.0 was programmed by Supercosm, designed by FusionLab, and made possible, in part, by the New York State Council on the Arts with the support of Governor Andrew Cuomo and the New York State Legislature. Wave Farm's 2018 program season is made possible, in part, with Public Funds from the Greene County Legislature through the Cultural Fund administered in Greene County by the Greene County Council on the Arts.

The Prankster Peopl e's Museum

The Prattsville Art Center is honored to be the recipient of a National Endowment for the Arts Grant, awarded for the creation of the *Prankster Peoples' Museum*, a public art project by Catskill artist Matt Bua. The "Museum" will be a

sculptural structure designed in the shape of a giant coyote head, built to house a new collection of our community's pranks, jokes, and tall tales to be created in stories, pictures, and artifacts, by residents across the Northern Catskills.

Construction of the Museum will begin this spring, and the community is welcome to participate in building and decorating the museum, its collection, and the surrounding garden. Free workshops in construction, ceramics, storytelling, digital printing, painting, and sculpture will be held each Sunday afternoon, in collaboration with Draga Susanj's Placemakers exhibition and Phoebe Potter's E(Art)h Club, to help residents and visitors to create work for the new museum and surrounding garden

Matt is one of our community's most respected artists, known for creating a wide range of unique hand-built structures including the Catamount People's Museum in Catskill and the Well Well Welles House at the Franconia Sculpture Park. In this project, he will reference the indigenous heritage of the region through the image of the Coyote, a notorious trickster figure in Native American lore, as well as the history of Prattsville's founder, Zadock Pratt, a successful tanning baron, who was a notorious prankster, known for driving his dog sleds down Main Street on hot summer days wearing a full set of furs.

This project is funded by the National Endowment for the Arts' Challenge America category, which features NEA support for projects that extend the reach of the arts to underserved populations—those whose opportunities to experience the arts are limited by geography,

ethnicity, economics, or disability. NEA's Chair Jane Chu has said, "At the National Endowment for the Arts, we believe that all people should have access to the joy, opportunities and connections the arts bring. NEA-supported projects, such as this one to the Prattsville Art Center, are good examples of how the arts build stronger and more vibrant communities, improve well-being, prepare our children to succeed, and increase the quality of our lives."

The PlaceMakers Space, is a 6-month long, interactive social art project, engaging visitors, artists, and residents in the design and creation of a communal artwork and garden just off the town's Main Street. Directed and curated by artist in residence, Draga Susanj, the garden design and craft workshops will pay close attention to climate resiliency and ecological sustainability, with the goal of creating an immersive living greenspace for the community. The *Placemakers Space* will offer a sanctuary garden for solitude and creation, and establish an outdoor environment to house PAC's gatherings, live events, sculpture shows, and the new Prankster People's Museum. A Gallery Reception will take place on March 24, 2018.

Free interactive workshops will be held every Sunday from 2-5pm from March-August 2018: topics for March and April will include: A Sense of Place classes in drawing, mixed media sculpture-structure, clay/glass tiles and mosaic making. Artwork

created by workshop participants will be featured in the gallery exhibition opening March 24th and shape the vision for the sculpting of the *PlaceMakers' Space*.

The vision for the communal Place Makers' Space will be developed in stages, through 2D and 3D works, which will be and exhibited along with prefabricated elements for the outdoor garden such as planted seeds, bird houses, and mosaic panels for the garden and sitting areas. The garden work will include tending to herbs, vegetables, local pollinating plants, housing of local pollinators and birds, irrigation, harvesting, pickling....an all-season interaction.

The Prattsville Art Center's programs are made possible, in part, with public funds from New York State Council on the Arts with the support of Governor Andrew Cuomo and the New York State Legislature and the Greene County Legislature through the 2018 County Initiative Program, administered in Greene County by the Greene County Council on the Arts.

LUMBERYARD Contemporary Performing Arts Officially Announces Major Construction Phase on Catskill Campus

LUMBERYARD Contemporary Performing Arts announced in November that the major construction phase has begun on its stateof-the-art performing arts center in Catskill, NY. Since LUMBERYARD's relocation from Washington, D.C. to Catskill, NY in 2016, all site preparation work is now complete. The project is moving forward ahead of schedule and will be ready for use by

LUMBERYARD is partnering with Vermont-based PC Construction, with offices in Poughkeepsie, on the effort to transform the former Dunn Builders Supply into a world-class performance and residence space. The location will serve artists by providing them technical support and residencies before a national or New York premiere.

"This marks an important milestone not only for our organization, but for the performing arts in New York State and the Northeast. Lumberyard is poised to make a tremendous economic impact here in the Catskills and Hudson Valley, and also forge a connection between upstate and downstate for artists, audiences and thought leaders from all over the world," said Adrienne Willis, executive and artistic director of LUMBERYARD.

A highlight of the four-building campus will be a flexible, columnfree, black box theatre space that can be reconfigured to replicate the variety of New York City and worldwide stages where resident-artists' works will ultimately premiere. The residencies will culminate in out-oftown premieres, which are widely seen as integral to the development of Broadway-bound theater productions but are rare for works of dance and contemporary performance.

As part of the construction project, LUMBERYARD will also literally raise the roof of the planned performance space by a full 20 feet. The major renovation will accommodate custom-made lighting, rigging, and scenic capabilities that can replicate the visions of America's most exciting performing artists, as well as the setup of any major theater in the U.S., and is a key element in making LUMBERYARD a world-class facility.

In August, LUMBERYARD Contemporary Performing Arts secured a \$5 million construction Ioan from California-based RSF Social Finance. Previously, the project was awarded two Regional Economic Development Council grants totaling \$800,000 in recognition of LUMBERYARD's potential to revitalize Catskill.




Dear Kay,



Miller has exhibited exten-



sively in museums and galleries throughout the United States including the Samuel Dorsky Museum of Art, Museum of New Mexico, Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, Austin Museum of Art, Dallas Museum of Art, Texas Artists Museum, and Longview Art Museum. Her work is included in many important public and private collections including The Samuel Dorsky Museum of Art, The Houston Museum of Fine Arts, Centex Corporation, Sterling Software, and SAP America Corporation.

Two recent series, In Search of a Landscape and Souvenirs bring to the forefront abstracted landscape elements

in my work. From the beginning, I have challenged myself to make good contemporary landscape art, I believe my paintings must explore the subject of artistic transformation and ways of making an age old painting tradition fresh and original. The content of my work comes from my plein-air painting investigations, photographs of the landscape that I have taken over the years, as well as my use of the medium of collage as a vehicle for exploring and inventing composition. My work has always

been about an expression of the embodiment of a duality between technique and imagery. My plein-air paintings are thickly painted, direct observations of nature. In the studio, my paintings often begin as an abstract color field with overpainted imagery that outlines classical landscapes. The technique subtractive painting technique combined with additive painterly approaches creates dramatic modulations of color and space, a wide variety of rich painterly techniques, my work obtains a physical presence of surface that underscores the beauty of the painted surfaces.

VOLUNTEER SASS!

(Service, Ambassadors, Stewards and Support!)

In the non-profit world, an organization is as strong as its volunteer force, and GCCA is no exception. In our 42-year history, we have had amazing volunteers help us with events, mailings, gallery installations, photography, and all sorts of things. Most recently, a team of volunteers helped our Visual Arts Director renovate the gallery, painting it from top to bottom and fixing things, with a very limited budget and tight schedule. The effort was led by two v in particular, Daniel Sierra and Yesenia Ganan.

Daniel Sierra is a mosaic artist who has lived in Catskill since 1997. Before that he lived in New York City and Miami. In the late 1980's and early 90's, he worked as an assistant to various artists including Keith Haring (on the infamous "Crack is Wack" campaign on the FDR), Carlos Alves, and the costume designer and businesswoman Patricia Field. Before painting the GCCA gallery, Sierra painted Joe's Garage, a 3,000 square foot event space at the top of Main Street. In his own words, Sierra helped GCCA because, "I had the time and energy and felt like doing something good."

Yesenia Ganan aka Yeshua aka J, a bigender/non-gender Multi-media Artist and farmer, in agriculture and livestock, has lived in Catskill for a little over three years, working as the 'Operational Manager' at Tello's Green Farms in Coxsackie, NY. Ganan is also involved with Habitat for Humanity in Hudson, N.Y, and certified for construction with Habitat for Humanity in Kingston, NY. A Red Cross volunteer in Disaster Relief, Ganan helped GCCA because "Artists' work should be the main center of attention when their opening takes place at Green County Council of the Arts." In the spare time, Ganan considers hobbies such as volunteering for non-profits organizations and helping the community involved in the arts a true delight. As Ganan puts it, "It's time to get your hands dirty and make a change."



Sierra and Ganan worked professionally and diligently almost every day for two weeks without compensation, even coming in when our Visual Arts Director wasn't here.
