# LINCOLN MAYORGA Talks About Orchestration

FREE MUSICAL EVENT AT THE **HUNTER-WADE STUDIO**

In a free musical event, Lincoln Mayorga will be talking about orchestration at the Hunter-Wade Studio, 40 Church Street, Chatham, NY on November 3, 2018 at 3 pm. He will be assisted by recorded orchestrations and three live singers, Robert Osborne, bass-baritone, Terressa Mannix, mezzo-soprano, and Nick Manzella, tenor, who will add their voices to the orchestrations to demonstrate how the elements merge to advance character and story.

Marion Hunter is the recipient of the 2018 Individual Artist Tier from the NYSCA/Decentralization Community Arts Grant Program administered in Columbia County by the Greene County Council on the Arts. Hunter used the funding aimed at advancing her orchestration skills and the musical theater project called NINA. This free discussion is offered in connection with the grant.

Though orchestration was the main focus of the grant, two auxiliary projects were included, the first a writers' experiment in which a group listened to three of the songs and created scenes making use

of them. The second is this lecture on orchestration presented by pianist/conductor/arranger Lincoln

of them. The second is this lecture on orchestration presented by pianist/conductor/arranger Lincoln Mayorga.

Mayorga's wide-ranging musical career is perfectly suited to a discussion of the principles of orchestration and their application. He has toured the United States and Europe as a concert performer, played with Hollywood orchestras and conducted and arranged for famous instrumentalists and singers. Lincoln Mayorga has worked across the range of musical styles from classics through jazz, pop, and theater music. He co-owned the recording studio Sheffield Lab and produced many recordings. During this free mucial event he is expected to talk about principles of orchestration and use the songs to illustrate their adherence or departure from them.

The NINA songs have been recorded by area musicians with Valatie sound engineer Joseph Jurchak and pianist/ teacher/conductor Uel Wade.

If the above-mentioned writers' experiment sounds like a back-

If the above-mentioned w ters' experiment sounds like a bac wards way to work on a musical,

is. NINA already had a collection of music and lyrics, but only an outline for the story. Though Hunter says that, in her view, the characters were already well defined, she expected that the way a group of creative people looked at the some of the material—and dealt with it—would be an opening-up influence. The Hudson area group, Plays in Progress (PIP), agreed to listen (away from story-context) and write. In the end, they decided to make it a group-creation, and the resulting scene was assembled by Jesse Waldinger and titled "Echo In Love."

The PIP experiment did, in fact, spark Hunter to move ahead on the script and it is now nearly finished. Herstory is quite different from "Echo In Love," yet she calls the experiment an "inspiration" and "a sharpener."

The Mayorga talk will begin at 3 pm at the Hunter-Wade Studio in Chatham, NY and, although the event is free, attendees are advised to make reservations at 518-392-4697 to assure an available chair.



Pyotr llyich Tchaikovsky is a musical titan in 19th Century Russia: hugely popular, incredibly charismatic, deeply emotional, mercurial, explosive. Tortured by his homosexuality, he finds release only in composing and in his love for the son of his invalid sister. Joe Jessup is a quiet, unassuming, and very private high school Earth Sciences teacher in suburban Washington state, a man who has long since resigned himself to not getting exactly what he might wish for out of life. For years, his only emotional outlet has been his love for the music of Tchaikovsky and, more recently, his furtive calls to a gay sex chatline – but merely to listen to the young man on the other end of the phone, never to speak himself. Actor Jason Guy, whom audiences may remember from his tour-de-force performance in Bridge Street's 2017 world premiere of Kieron Barry's "The Official Adventures of Kieron and Jade", portrays both these characters as their worlds intertwine and each struggles to find some sort of fulfillment in his life.

# Chilly Willy winter's eve tours BRONCK **MUSEUM**

Costumed guides at the Bronck Museum lead Chilly Willy Winter's Eve tours, a celebration of a series of ancient, but now mostly forgotten celebration, on Nov. 17 & 18, 2018.

There had already been more than a few frosty mornings. The welcome hours of extra light provided by the harvest and the hunter's moons had already come and gone. The snow moon would arrive soon. Each afternoon as the retreating sun sank in the west. arrive soon. Each afternoon as the retreating sun sank in the west, deep shadows crept from corners to envelope the whole house in a dim chill. The attics and cellars are filled with barrels of corn, piles of fat squash and pumpkins. Strings of dried apples dangle from the beams. The cider has been made and stored in the barrel cellar. Sweet and savory pies have been piled in beams. The cider has been made and stored in the barrel cellar. Sweet and savory pies have been piled in the attic chests to await the arrival of the truly freezing temperatures of winter. Soon it would be cold enough to butcher and to make candles. This was the season the first European colonists knew as "harvest home" a time for celebration. On the weekend of November 17 and 18, 2018 the Bronck Museum, near Coxsackie, NY, will hold its Chilly Willy Willy Winter's Eve tours, a celebration of a series of ancient, but now mostly forgotten celebrations. The venerable Bronck houses will be decorated for the celebrations of Martinmas, St. Nicholas Day and St. Lucia Day. The ancient legends will be told. Visitors will learn how a

goose was replaced by a turkey and how one old holiday gave rise to two modern holidays. The Martinmas lanterns are lit, the corn dolly hangs on the front door beside the Lucy bundle. Inside the klompen are ready. The Lucy Kator sits patiently on the parlor stairs and the Lucy crown has been prepared. Visitors will be led by a costumed guide and pass through rooms which approximate the temperatures and light levels present during winters in the 1700's. Warm attire is strongly suggested! Swedish and Dutch refreshments will be served. The tours leave from the Bronck Museum Visitor Center at 11 am, 1 pm and 3 pm each day. Seating for this special event is limited and is offered on a first come first served basis. Adult admission for this event is \$8, GCHS members and children \$4. 

# GCCA 2018 SPROUTS SUMMER ARTS **WORKSHOPS**

WRAPS-UP ANOTHER SEASON EXPLORING THE ARTS!







SPROUTS concludes another season of summer-time fun for Greene County youngsters in creative arts workshops. The program brings weeklong workshops in Art, Music, Theater and Dance taught by professional artists, free of charge, to Greene County children ages 3 - 7. Six weeks of SPROUTS convened in various locations throughout the county during July and August in Windham, Coxsackie, Cairo, Greenville, Hunter and Catskill. In each of the six weeks artists shared with young children the joy of their art form and encourage them to use their imagination to create and learn. Art teacher Colette Lemmon remarked, "I had one boy who found new and wonderful ways to do everything that lintroduced."

Many delightful projects occurred over the six weeks of the

Many delightful projects occurred over the six weeks of the SPROUTS Program of 2018. The following are just a few examples of the creative fun and collective art projects that took place over. Sarah Barker's art classes in Cairo made dragonflies mobiles about 6" to 10" long. Ms. Barker mentions, "They are mobiles because I hung them from a stick that they painted, so the dragonfly was in the air. I used natural sticks for the bodies and they wadded up paper to start the armature of the head they then finished the head with paper mache put on with glue water. They attached wings of pipe cleaners and strung it to a 1"x 2" cut piece of wood I primed white before they painted it with the ideas from the first two days work."

In Greenville Colette Lemmon's art projects included making their own "scratch art" pieces by coloring the entire surface with crayons to create blocks of color, then covering with black paint, then, days later, scratching off designs. She also did a project creating relief by "drawing" with black glue (glue with black paint added which dried somewhat 3-dimensionally) and then using watercolors, diluted food coloring which was similar to what they are always told NOT to do. In the Hunter location Donna Trunzo taught Theater and Dale Loughran taught Dance. They used literature as a springboard to creativity in a musical called Giraffes Can't Dance. The performance used movement and storytelling to explore themes dealing with acceptance, friendship and the importance of perseverance. Students learned that music and dance can be used to communicate emotions and to tell stories with a beginning, middle, and end. They learned that a good story usually has a problem that must somehow be solved. Children also discovered that music, dance, and theater are really fun!

Tasha Depp worked with children to made clay animal sculptures. Carlie Goorzorian showed young artists how to make 3-D drawings with shaving cream that hardened when dry. Margo Muller developed a play based on local history. In Kate Boyer's music class there were instruments galore throughout the room and encouraged young hands to touch, listen and learn. Lora Lee Ecobeli shared her experience teaching theater and the budding thespians acted out an old classic "Goldilocks and Three Bears."

# Barbara Walter

I wanted to be an artist at a very young age. Because of a fear of heights, my mom often left me with a neighbor when she went shopping at malls with escalators. The neighbor had coloring books to keep me occupied and I was in heaven. My love of art continued into high school, but I majored in math and economics in college-all because the art teacher failed to show up for our high school career counseling day while the math teacher did.

Toward the end of my business career that I began to create art again. By that time, I had discovered Greene County and the Hudson River Valley Art Workshops at the Greenville Arms 1889 Inn. The wonderful workshops offered in Greenville became my art school. Over the years, I have continued to take lessons from the nationally known artists who teach at the Inn. I also look for interesting art classes wherever I travel. Each class improves my understanding of how to create good art, through better composition, values, or technique.

My background in business actually contributes to my process as an artist. Like in business, a large aspect art is about solving problems—how to capture a particular light or how to make a painting more dramatic. I gain pleasure from solving the problem of making a painting better, experiencing a little joy each time a paint stroke, by design or sometimes just by luck, creates a better work of art. My hope is that others find pleasure in looking at my work, either from the composition or the combination of color. It is successful if it sparks a fond memory for them just as it does for me.

While I have painted with water-color, oils, and encaustic, my recent works are in acylics. I am attracted to the purity and brightness of colors from the paint tube. In addition, the quickness with which the paints dry gives me freedom to be spontaneous. There is no worry about getting every stroke "right", since it can be painted over again.

Acrylics in my view work especially well over gessoed watercolor and the pains dry

cially well over gessoed watercolor paper, with the textured paper adding a subtlety to the design. One of my recent series features ballerinas inspired by an old photo and memo-ries of taking ballet lessons at the YMCA. The paintings of a dancer or dancers capture their presence on the stage, while leaving their thoughts a mystery.

My most recent work is concen-trated in a series called "Walking the

Dog(s)." During the simple activity of walking a pet, I enjoy the beautiful views in Greene County. It is also a time to simply delight in the antics of an animal companion or to resolve some issue on my mind. These newest works are on a larger scale and more primitive than my more traditional works in oil.

No, no, they're not a Russian law firm. No, they are not part of Paul Manafort's rolodex. They are composers who survived the Russian Revolutions of the early 20th century. Their works are largely unknown outside of Russia, even

largely unknown outside of Russia, even to musicians, and only recently have they begun to be recorded.

One of the Bend-the-Knotted-Oak duos (violist Ronald Carbone and pianist/BKO-artistic-director Uel Wade) will perform selected works from the period on Sunday, November 18, 2018 at 3 pm, at the Wade-Hunter studio, 40 Church Street, Chatham, NY. Admission is \$20, and persons under eighteen are admitted free.

Varvara Gaigerova was a child prodigy. She was afforded musical opportunities because of Communist ideology, which dared to suggest that the sexes should be equal. Her exposure was also a result of the paucity of males at the time, due to deaths in wars, revolutions, and purges. Her Sonata for

males at the time, due to deaths in wars, revolutions, and purges. Her Sonata for viola, which BKO will perform, is fueled by Romantic passion and Russian folk traditions.

Alexander Winkler, a composer of German descent, was a professor at the

German descent, was a professor at the St. Petersburg Conservatory. This viola work does variations on an old Breton folk tune, a "doing" frowned on by the Soviet governme



Alexey Stanchinsky was a musical genius; however, he suffered from schizophrenia and committed suicide at age twenty-six. Wade will play two solos from the composer's "Sketches," which sound like deeply felt emanations from his Russian soul. We are lucky to have this work, as his challenging music had little chance of being performed in post-Revolutionary Russia. Russia had its own versions of the Bach and Couperin families, who produced several major composers: they are the Kreins. The youngest Krein, Julian, was a prodigy as pianist (age two) and composer (age six). He was published at age twelve. The BKO duo will perform his Sonata, a work influenced by Scriabin and the French Impressionists.

Julian's father, Alexander, will be represented by several piano solos,

Julian's father, Alexander, will be represented by several piano solos, including some based on ancient Russian dances. They have strong tunes and luscious, jazz harmonies.

Like these composers, the viola as a solo instrument is under-exposed, and the discovery of these works is a boon to its repertoire. In the hands of a master such as Carbone (Met Opera, St. Luke's, and extensive chambermusic performance), this Russian music is delivered rich and sweet, and Wade gets to indulge his digging-for-musicalgets to indulge his digging-for-musical gold habits.




